Training Tomorrow's Leaders Today

A major key to ZOE's long-term strategy is to raise up a generation of leaders to transform Thailand from within. We believe that only when the citizens of Thailand stand up and speak out in strong opposition to human trafficking, that lasting change will come. We know that it is not foreign organizations or workers that will be the change agent in Thailand, but the Thai people themselves. But we believe we are called to come alongside and encourage, educate, and equip them to take on this battle.

That is why ZOE Ministry School (ZMS) was established ten years ago.

The goal of ZMS is to produce graduates

who have a sound knowledge of the Bible, who have learned and begun to master the principles of leadership and business, have a passing ability to speak English and Thai, and who are educated and articulate regarding all aspects of human trafficking, particularly with respect to the trafficking of children.

Our 2-year leadership academy inculcates in young adults a "can-do" attitude and focuses on character development, self-sufficiency, personal responsibility, confidence, and common sense.

ZMS instruction emphasizes in-class learning as well as hands-on experience. Students receive a full day of instruction in Bible studies, business/leadership, English, and stewardship.

They also go on outreaches once every two weeks to help with human trafficking prevention education and evangelization.

Ron and Cissy both teach in ZMS, with Ron teaching several Bible courses as well as a leadership development class while Cissy is head and chief instructor of the English Department and teaches business/ leadership classes year-round.

These impressive young men and women are having a tremendous impact. Not only have many Thais heard the Good News and accepted Christ through their influence, but many ZMS grads are now on staff at ZOE rescuing and restoring trafficked children!

Through the generous grant from the U.S. State Department, ZOE now has a complete fitness and workout room. We have everything from a 6-station multi-gym and Smith machine to boxing apparatus, elliptical, dumbbells, barbells, kettle bells and medicine balls. All this equipment is set up in an open-air, 900-square-foot facility.

Now there's no excuse for any of our missionaries, Thai staff, leadership school students, or ZOE children to be out of shape!

Our new gym is the latest sports resource to be added to our campus. At ZOE we now have a swimming pool, trampoline, bicycles, playground equipment, ping-pong tables, as well as basketball, soccer, volleyball, badminton, and takraw courts.

We believe that physical activity and exercise are integral to the healing process for trafficking survivors.

Exercise has tremendous therapeutic benefits for all kids but especially for children who have been through traumatic experiences. Studies show that physical activity can lead to better grades, improved concentration, and more restful sleep. With exercise, it is proven that kids are mentally sharper, display more confidence, have less stress and are even in better moods throughout the day.

Our goal is to give each of our ZOE children as much opportunity for a successful life as possible. By encouraging our kids and staff to embrace a healthy lifestyle, we will all soon be fit as a fiddle!



ISRAEL IS REAL!

This spring I traveled to Israel for nine days of a jam-packed trip of biblical pilgrimages, geo-political lectures, and insightful local perspectives.

A REASON TO RESCUE

Until she was 7, she lived in a mountaintop Karen village of only 9 families, no electricity, and no running water. Her father was a farmer and a preacher, working land and hearts for a

precious harvest. The second of 8 children, she never knew what a full stomach felt like. At 7, she moved to a village with a school and soon realized she wanted a better life – and that education was the key.

This is Fah's story.

Setting her mind to work, after high school she attended Chiang Mai Rajabhat University, graduating with a degree in community development. Her first job was at a children's center where, one day,

she received a call from a stranger asking if she wanted to work at a place called ZOE. In December 2005 she began at ZOE as childcare staff. After a year, ZOE asked her to join our Child Rescue team and she's been rescuing kids

ever since. Along the way, Fah received her Social Worker license as well as a license under the national Child Protection Act which authorizes her to take custody of children to remove them

from dangerous situations.

When asked what motivates her to advocate for trafficked children, she says that because she once had nothing and God rescued her, that now she wants to give back and knows that God desires to use her to rescue others. Jeremiah 17:7-8 is her favorite Bible verse.

Fah met Three at ZOE and they were married in a 2011 ceremony Ron officiated (see our Winter 2011 edition).

Window shopping and time with

friends are her favorite leisure activities.

Fah is grateful to ZOE's leadership for being good role models and she is thankful for the things she's learned at ZOE, especially those things to do with leading a disciplined life of faith.
