Summer Enrichment Program 2018 "Can-Do Kids Club"

This year's program entitled, "Light Force," ran four Wednesdays in June from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. A total of 25 children were registered with an average of 20 kids per week. Over 20 adult volunteers assisted with various tasks, i.e., food, recreation, attendance/name tags, photography, assembly coordinator, team leader/assistants.

The theme, "Walking in the Light," focused on helping the children walk in the love and security God provides through His Son and the Holy Spirit as they navigate their way in a society that has lost its moral compass. News of mass shootings, stranger danger, practicing campus shut downs and off campus evacuations as well as a constant bombardment of news on homelessness and natural disasters has become a regular part of their lives. The intent of the program was to help the kids walk in the light God provides in spite of the pervading darkness of sin and to hopefully share this light with others.

Snacks were served each morning and activities relating to the theme were provided for those arriving early. The morning and closing assemblies were led by Pastor Stan who provided a brief message of the day's theme and songs. Thereafter, the children had recreational exercise and craft time. After closing assembly, the kids were served lunch and given free books to take home.

Each child earned a maximum of four pogs daily and on the final day exchanged them for items in the Gift Store. Besides their craft creations, a "gift" (pendant, snap on wrist band, book marker and flashlight) with a Bible verse inscribed was distributed on each Wednesday. T-shirts were also distributed for the kids to wear on the Sunday of their performance.

Thank you to all who assisted in making this year's program a success.

Pastor's Corner

"kairos and chronos"

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the sun.
 Ecclesiastes 3:1a

Multiple times each year I sit down and talk with a handful of people about one of the most important topics in life ... time. When a loved one passes away, I read Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, and try to assist the family in perceiving and embracing seasons that are changing.

In the Greek language, kairos & chronos are two distinct concepts. These concepts are equally distinct for us, but unfortunately, in English one word, "time," is used for both concepts. This blurs the distinction. While kairos refers to things like moments, opportunities, or "the time is right," chronos refers to things that happen according to clocks and calendars.

Anyone reading the New Testament will see that Jesus had a very strong sense of time, but his chronos time was submitted to kairos time. Jesus knew when his time drew near (John 7:6, 13:1). Even His incarnation happened "in the fullness of time" (Galatians 4:4). Jesus operated so much out of kairos, that he often upset the religious leaders for healing on the Sabbath. For Jesus, it was time to heal, but to the religious leaders, it was the seventh day of the week.

Most people will make "drop-everything" adjustments to chronos types of activities for the sake of kairos. For example, when Hurricane Lane threatened Hawaii, "time to prepare" overruled almost everything! Now, kairos is not only for big events. Think about this ... do you go to the bathroom because it's 10:28 AM, or because it's time to go?! ☺

We run into trouble when we are unable to make the distinction between kairos and chronos time, and it can be big! Some get stuck in past seasons, unable to embrace the new thing God has in store for them. Some are so excessively tied to the clock that the virtue of punctuality becomes an altar upon which relationships are sacrificed. Most of us have difficulty seeing new things God is doing because we are glued to the clocks and calendars of life.

Take the Quiz – is it kairos or chronos? Circle one ... or both!

- * Buy a new car (kairos / chronos)
- * Get married (kairos / chronos)
- * Attending Worship Service (kairos / chronos)
- * Worship the Lord (kairos / chronos)
- * Move dad to a care home (kairos / chronos)
- * Give to the poor (kairos / chronos)
- * Invite a friend to church. (kairos / chronos)
- * Change cat litter (kairos / chronos)
- * Hawaii Little League winning the World Championship (kairos / chronos)

If you are a follower of Jesus Christ, discerning kairos from chronos can help you perceive the new seasons God has for you! If you are not a follower of Jesus Christ, this is an opportunity to choose Him. Like all opportunities, the kairos opportunity to choose Him will close one day. Why wait? Ask Jesus to be your savior, and experience the transforming love of God today!
