## Elder's Corner

#### WOCC (walk) by F.A.I.T.H.

Happy Easter! As Jesus lay in the tomb, we can only imagine what the state of the disciples' faith was. To say that it was crushed, would be an understatement. However, a few days later, the disciples' faith was not only restored, it was emboldened. And as we look forward to celebrating the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, it's a great time to reflect upon the condition of our F.A.I.T.H.

At the beginning of the year we had a series of sermons that summed up the characteristics that we strive to live by as Christians. To make things simple, we used an acrostic titled "F.A.I.T.H." It was a challenging and reflective series of sermons that also served as a call to action. Here's a quick summary of what F.A.I.T.H. is all about:

**F** for <u>Faithful</u>. The foundation of faithfulness is solidified in the ability of a person to suffer for Christ, submit to authority, and delay gratification. Faithfulness is valued much more highly than gifts and abilities because if a disciple is not faithful, it does not matter how gifted they are.

**A** for <u>A</u>vailable. This statement by Brother Andrew, "God does not choose people because of their ability, but because of their availability," was an important point shared. Also, being available is beneficial for several reasons. It expands your Christian life experiences and wisdom. It enables you to be a blessing to others. It also pleases God!

I for Initiative. There are two types of initiative: Personal and Group. Personal initiative is taking care of your responsibilities without being told to. Examples ranged from doing chores/work to being diligent with prayer and reading the Bible. Group initiative is the influence imprinted on others by a person's initiative. Examples include offering to lead a Small Group, volunteering to organize an activity or offering prayer to others.

**T** for <u>Teachable</u>. *No be hard head!* Humility is a key to being teachable. Pride will hinder us from receiving all that God wants us to learn. Can we "fail forward" and learn from mistakes? Do we accept constructive criticism and use it to grow? Lastly, we need to be vulnerable and seek counsel and feedback from Godly people.

**H** for <u>H</u>eart. We were reminded that the heart is deceitful above all things and that we must allow God to gradually transform our heart into His heart. When our hearts are brought into the light and we use our hearts to serve the Lord, we know that we will receive a reward much greater than anything of this world.

I could go on and on about F.A.I.T.H. but, I was tasked with condensing these sermons into a few paragraphs. It definitely does not do the sermons any justice.
