I remember the next thing we did was either say the pledge of allegiance or the Lord's prayer. I can't remember which came first. Then came singing a song. We were taught patriotic songs, in addition to Farmer In the Dell, Yankee Doodle Dandy and Auld Lang Syne. This was probably 1949 and America was still healing from the Second World War.

Oh, I might add that we were also led in the Lord's Prayer at every morning break and lunch, all the way up to the sixth grade. Isn't that amazing? So we said the Lord's Prayer three times a day. Though I was being raised in a Buddhist home, God's seed was planted in me in the first grade at Napoopoo School.

Even as a child, I loved to sing. To this day, I get a lump in my throat when I am moved to sing God Bless America, America the Beautiful or Battle Hymn of the Republic.

X-rays and CAT scans were done on my knee, head and face. I was given a leg brace and walker and was instructed by the ER physician to go to see an orthopedic surgeon. He recommended Dr. Chang. I was unable to drive, so Julie invited me to stay with her. When I used to see people with injured faces, I used to think, "how can that happen?" Now I know. My hand was too slow to block my fall.

I called to make an appointment with Dr. Chang and found out he was in his Pali Momi office only on Wednesdays. He was booked until the following week. I had an upcoming Vegas trip so asked if I could see him sooner. The receptionist said, "yes, in Kapolei at 10 a.m. on Thursday." I told the receptionist, "I'll take it."

On Thursday using my walker, I slowly made my way from the parking lot to Dr. Chang's office. While I was checking in, a greeter asked Julie if she would like to use a wheelchair that was available. Julie said yes; it would be way, way easier than me using my walker. While we were in the waiting room, we encountered a young man using crutches. I told Julie, "See if I had gotten crutches, I would have been faster." She said, "Yes, but look how young and how much stronger he is." Reluctantly, I had to agree. Alas, youth and strength is waning.

Dr. Chang said that I had a vertical fracture of my kneecap which was better than a horizontal fracture. It would heal easier and faster without surgery. He wanted me to return to see him in two weeks. After he tested to see how I could "walk" for about ten feet, he "recommended" that I not go to Vegas. WHAT?!? No Vegas? I reluctantly decided to cancel the Vegas trip. Honestly, with my knee brace, how could I even close the restroom door on the airplane? My leg would be sticking out the door. Can you visualize it? Ha! It would look pretty funny.

Reflecting on my "trip" (pun intended; sorry, no omiyage for anyone, LOL), my blessings are that Dr. Chang had an opening on Thursday, I had no facial fractures, my fractured kneecap was vertical and not horizontal, and I had no damage to my eye (just five days earlier I had had cataract surgery). I also had Julie who was willing to be my chauffeur and caregiver and family and friends who were praying for me and kept in contact to see how I was doing. I could have gone to church a week after my accident, but my vanity prevented me from going. My eye was still black and blue and very swollen.

Pastor Stan called to see how I was doing and asked me to send him a photo of my eye. I told him to not be stupid or I was going to hit him with a "rubbah slippah". We had a good laugh.

God has again confirmed that He loves and cares for me. Things could have been far worse. Thank you, Lord, for being my along-sider.
