What began as a typically normal day suddenly turned into a double emergency both needing immediate attention. My then three-year-old grandson, Jaxon, had just minutes before complained that he was having trouble breathing. He looked quite distressed. A mild panic set in and not knowing what to do, I called and made an appointment with his pediatrician. No sooner had I gotten off the phone, when it rang. It was Joel with an alarming message, "Mom, I got a call that our house is on fire. Can you go check!" What to do? "Lord, please calm my nerves." Fortunately, my husband Ken was home that day. It was quickly decided...I'd take Jaxon to the doctor while he checked on the house.

My task ended in comic relief, although I didn't see the humor at that time. While checking Jaxon in at the doctor's, he gave a big "Achoo!" and out popped a big yellow bead. The receptionist looked at me with a smile and said, "No charge," while she crossed his name off her clipboard. Ken's news, however, was grim. The duplex home which Joel's family shared with his parents had burned beyond recognition.

Walking through the rubble and ash of what was once their home was a soul-wrenching experience. The charred remains of Sabrina, the family's pet cat, was found near the kitchen door. We could only imagine the desperate attempt she had made to escape the fire. Lost forever, for both Joel and his parents, were priceless mementos of wedding photos, birthday celebrations, baby albums, locks of hair from Jake's and Jaxon's first haircuts, and so much more. But, then, amidst the ash of a burnt baby book was a solitary word (Smiling) left unscathed on a page fringed with black. Was there anything to be smiling about?

In actuality, there was a lot to smile about. Taken from a *could-have-been-worse* perspective, the family had escaped harm. Had the fire started at night when all were asleep, the only exit would have been through the bedroom windows. The fire had started in the office due to a faulty power strip. Escape down the hallway to the front and side entrances would have been impossible. The fire would also have destroyed the cars belonging to both families. Fortunately, Snibbles, their pet dog, escaped harm and was retrieved at the Humane Society. A good Samaritan had turned him in. "Thank you, Lord!" Joel's parents were able to move in with his brother's family and Jen, Joel and the boys were welcomed at our home.

Aloha from out of the ashes? Yes, more than we could have imagined. Our living room was soon filled with boxes upon boxes of donated items. Outpourings of love and concern came from all avenues of communications and gifts from relatives, friends, our WOCC family, and even from classmates living on the mainland whom Joel had not seen for quite a while.

God is good, all the time! He had turned a seemingly tragic experience into an opportunity to express His love in more ways than one. It opened up, for us as a family, an immeasurable heartfelt gratitude that we will long remember.

This shared experience is a mere microcosm of the devastation caused by the Maui fires; so may it be that the outcome of ALOHA and blessings be increased a hundred-fold, and more, as God's matchless grace prevails upon His people on Maui.
