Charles F. Stanley wrote a devotional that spoke to me:

"1 Chronicles 29:12 'In Your hand it is to make great and to give strength to all."

The Lord desires to heal you of old emotional wounds and memories, and to heal you so completely that you no longer rely on any of the crutches you have used in the past as a substitute for trust in God... God alone wants to be the permanent – yes, eternal – solution for every difficulty or problem you encounter... He is the ultimate and final Source of your strength, healing, and comfort. God wants you to be utterly and completely dependent upon Him, not upon any other person or thing."

Looking back on my life, I used to always get angry about things when they didn't go my way. I used to lash out at my family if things were not up to MY standard. This was God's timing as I was now open to learning from it. It was a 60-day devotional; a lesson each day. It started me on a journey. I started to change a little, but I still didn't like myself. But the door to my heart was opened.

Once I started having a relationship with Jesus, He brought people into my life to help me. The honesty that my friends presented to me hurt me a lot. I got angry and didn't understand why they couldn't see my point. WRONG! I couldn't see their point because I rationalized why it wasn't my fault. Have you ever stopped talking to a person who was your friend because they told you a truth that you didn't agree with, so you never called them back? I did. I didn't call the person back until I started to realize, she was a true friend and in spite of being afraid of destroying our friendship, she told me her truth about what she saw about me. It also helps to have friends to give truthful advice, but whether I take their advice or not, it's my choice. God and I know my situation best.

Julie recently told me that I was a crazy person back then. I agree, but I know that I'm not that crazy person anymore. I like the renewed me that God helped me to become.
